

History

Kucom Theatre Incorporated, in Mackay Queensland, has a very long history. In 1947 the Mackay Community Theatre was formed to present quality theatre productions for the Mackay Community. And they did so for many years until, in the mid '70s, a younger group of members wanted to change the traditional direction, which included classical plays and musicals at the exclusion of modern comedy. They formed a new group which would be dedicated to the production and presentation of professional quality theatre. This group was called Kudos Theatre and breathed new life into the local theatre scene. After a number of years Kudos and the original Mackay Community Theatre merged under the name Kudos Community Theatre, later changing to Kucom Theatre on incorporation.

Mission statement

To promote excellence in the production and presentation of theatre of all forms, as well as the exhibition of art forms, and all cultural activities. This includes training in all aspects of theatre arts in the Mackay Regional Area and elsewhere and to provide support for other community groups where possible.

There is a sense among those who make the arts happen in regional Australia that funding bodies are "city-centric". What is not always realised by arts bureaucrats (and politicians who ultimately have the final say in supporting the arts) is that it is the regional centres of Australia where many of the nation's creative people have begun active and often professional careers. This is no more so than in Mackay, a city of more than 100 000 people.

Mackay has a strong tradition of theatre arts. Kucom Theatre, with its roots dating back to the early part of last century, has always been a progressive and creative arts centre. That it is basically a self-funding organisation with its own theatre and a tradition of good local patronage, should demonstrate the importance of its position in the cultural life of this part of Australia. But this record of "local patronage" has not come without the local community's unshakeable trust and pride in the organisation called Kucom Theatre.

In regional Australia, the arts are alive because organisations like Kucom are strong. The future of all theatre arts in Australia will be strong too, as long as funding bodies and governments accept that the nation's arts culture can only be as strong as the arts culture of ALL Australians.

About us

Kucom Theatre is a not-for-profit organisation. Over our long history we have regularly encouraged community involvement in performance works of a high standard and provided creative opportunities for actors, directors, set designers, lighting and sound technicians. Training is available for young and old as well as those who have disabilities. Our Youth Drama Group caters for students 13 to 18 years of age and the Theatre Sports Program is aiming to provide

experiences new for younger adults as well as older people who are keen. Kucom is also happy to encourage local people to write their own plays for us to perform. While we do not provide direct training for future employment as such many of our past members have found places in the performance industry as actors or fulltime backstage and lighting as well as sound technicians.



My first experience with Kucom was when I was 20. I was running a lot at the time and decided to stop in to Kucom on my way from training one evening. I attended a show, which I can't remember or the actors in it but I must have enjoyed the experience enough to turn up to an audition for a romantic comedy. Kucom has provided valuable support for the wider community by utilising established communication links with our wide support network through Facebook, Instagram, our Network News and local radio stations. Much of what Kucom does depends very much on the development of our own theatre space to perform in and make available to others. Community Theatre had acquired an old house and land back in 1966, which was used as a clubhouse. It was financed with 'chook raffles' in the local pub. In the late '70s, as the cost for venues became prohibitive, the Clubhouse was transformed under Kudos Community Theatre to a little theatre venue which could seat 65 people for a performance. In 2011 the Clubhouse and land were sold.

This strategic plan covers the move to our new theatre and the projects we have had to look at in order to get the theatre building up to a performing standard, as well as things we will need to do to develop the building further in an effort to expand its community use.



Currently we are concentrating on raising funds to install retractable tiered seating. Tiered seating is important in a theatre to give every audience member the opportunity for uninhibited viewing of productions. Retractable seating provides greater flexibility in auditorium space. The Youth Drama Class uses the auditorium space, as does the Theatre Sports training session, and in the future we hope to make it more available to other community groups.

Kucom has not previously had a formal strategic plan, which is why some historical information relating to the theatre development has been included here along with the future plans.
